SPC at La Villita's Holiday Village





On Dec. 14, St. Philip's College was front and center as La Villita Historic Arts Village hosted its first annual "Holiday in the Village." This free, family-friendly event blended San Antonio's rich cultural history with holiday festivities, celebrating the legacy of St. Philip's College—founded in La Villita in 1898.

From 1 to 8 p.m., visitors enjoyed the excitement of the winter wonderland, with live music, festive foods, a holiday market, and interactive activities for all ages. The event, a collaboration between La Villita Historic Arts Village, Chef Johnny Hernandez's Kitchen Campus Foundation and St. Philip's College, offered a unique

blend of history and holiday.

One of the event's highlights was the dedication of a life-sized Holiday Cottage, built by 20 students from St. Philip's College's Construction Technology program. The structure, standing 15 feet tall, honors the original site of the college, which began in La Villita over 126 years ago. The dedication was by Dr. Adena Williams Loston, President of St. Philip's College.

"This holiday project is a perfect example of our students applying their skills to bring history and culture to life. The structure that served as the first site of St. Philip's School still stands here at La Villita, and this project honors our college's rich legacy,"

said St. Philip's College President Dr. Adena Williams Loston.

The event also featured a Gingerbread House Competition, with three teams of Baking and Pastry students from St. Philip's College competing for scholarships. The competition, led by Chef Instructor Cynthia De La Fuente, allowed students to showcase their creativity.

La Villita holds a special place in St. Philip's history. Founded in 1898 as a vocational school, it has grown into a multi-campus college serving over 17,000 students and offering 47 workforce programs, including Baking and Pastry and Construction Technology.

SPC Culinary Arts Students Prepare 15,000 Tacos for the SA Community

Over 20 students from four culinary arts classes at St. Philip's College gathered on Jan. 24 to prepare 15,000 tacos for the San Antonio community during the second annual Cowboy Breakfast, hosted by the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo and Spurs Give.

The students began preparations at midnight, using 23,000 eggs, 3,700 sausage links, 475 pounds of beans, 475 pounds of bacon, and 475 pounds of chorizo to fill 15,000 tortillas. The event, held from 5 a.m. to 10 a.m. in Parking Lot 6 at the Frost Bank Center, marked the official start of the Bar-B-Que Cook-Off weekend and the San Antonio Stock Show & Rodeo.

Attendees enjoyed a wide variety of breakfast tacos and coffee for free. In a show of community support, a \$15,000 scholarship check was presented to the St. Philip's College Culinary Arts program during the event.

"I love being part of the Cowboy Breakfast because it brings back memories of my time as a student and volunteer. Now, as an instructor, I have the privilege of leading our college's participation. The event provides our culinary arts students a chance to showcase their skills and opens doors to scholarship opportunities," said Chef Instructor John Munoz.

St. Philip's College Honors Martin Luther King Jr.

On Jan. 20, 2025, St. Philip's College (SPC) joined more than 100,000 marchers in San Antonio's 38th Annual Martin Luther King Jr. March, one of the largest in the nation, to honor Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Nearly 50 students, staff, faculty, and administrators braved the weather, with temperatures hovering around 25°F and windchills dropping to 20°F.

Despite the bitter cold, the SPC contingent marched with pride, leading the education section of the event. Their banner, proudly displaying the St. Philip's College name, stretched across the group as they completed the two-and-a-half-mile route from MLK Drive to Pittman-Sullivan Park.

A week later, on Jan. 29, 2025, the SPC community continued commemorating Dr. King's legacy on-campus during their Martin Luther King Jr. Remembrance Ceremony & Solidarity March. The ceremony, hosted in the atrium of the Center for Health Professions, brought together students, faculty, and community members to reflect on King's impact.

The event opened with a welcome from Student Government Association President Alayna Morgado. Student and cheerleader Taleah Faucett followed with a rendition of "Lift Every Voice and Sing." Guest speaker Stacey L. Adam Sr., a Converse city councilman, urged attendees to persevere, stating, "Keep going, no matter the obstacle." The ceremony concluded with Dean for Student Success Tommy Morris leading participants in "We Shall Overcome" as they marched to the Turbon Student Center.

Through both the citywide march and the on-campus remembrance event, SPC reaffirms its commitment to honoring Dr. King's legacy and ensuring his message of equality and justice remains alive.

St. Philip's College hosts its President's Lecture Series featuring CNN's Victor Blackwell



The President's Lecture Series at St. Philip's College began in 2002 and has since welcomed nearly 40 distinguished guest speakers from all backgrounds. Speakers include the original 1961 Mississippi Freedom Riders Hezekiah Watkins, and Patricia Baskerville Dilworth, LeVar Burton from Reading Rainbow, and former San Antonio Mayor Julian Castro.

St. Philip's College (SPC) reintroduced its President's Lecture Series on Feb. 4, 2025, after a six-year pause, featuring CNN journalist Victor Blackwell. Held at the college's Watson Fine Arts Center, the free event welcomed students, faculty, staff, and the San Antonio community to engage with the host of First of All with Victor Blackwell and co-anchor of CNN This Morning Weekend.

Victor shared his personal journey, describing how his passion for journalism began at the age of nine in his hometown of Baltimore, Maryland. He described how Paul Revere's story inspired him in the fourth grade: "He was a man who spread a message, who people listened to, and he made a difference." Watching local news anchor Al Sanders on the evening news also fueled his aspirations, and by 15, he had landed his first job at a radio station.

A proud graduate of Howard University, a Historically Black college and University (HBCU), he earned his bachelor's degree in Broadcast Journalism and was named one of the university's Top 150 Distinguished Alumni in 2016. Reflecting on his career, he stressed the importance of authenticity and resilience by encouraging SPC students to remember to ask themselves, "Am I betraying myself in this situation?"

Victor provided further insight into his approach to journalism by emphasizing the need for accuracy and fairness, sharing a powerful message: "Facts are negotiable. History is editable. But it's essential to tell a fair, balanced story." He discussed how his weekend show aims to elevate the voices of people of color, expanding the representation of marginalized communities in national media.

SPC Engineering Prototype Lab Interns from the Project SURE program recently met with College President Dr. Adena Williams Loston to present their latest projects, developed using new cutting-edge equipment, including a Prusa MK4S 3D Printer.

Project SURE, which stands for STEM Undergraduate Research Experience, designates its interns as Subject Matter Experts participating in engineering curriculum development, equipment testing and training, community engagement, and prototype development. The Project SURE program offers students real-world, careerworkforce readiness experiences to enhance their skills and support their journey toward earning STEM degrees and transferring to universities.

SPC Attends the Thurgood Marshall College Fund's 2025 Workforce Development Summit

St. Philip's College students Estrella Hahn and Montana Pozos, along with Director of Career Readiness and Experiential Learning Services James Cooper, attended the Thurgood Marshall College Fund's Inaugural Workforce Development Summit from Jan. 29 to Feb. 1 in Birmingham, AL

The three-day event provided a platform to connect workforceready talent from Historically Black Community Colleges (HBCCs) with industry leaders and community stakeholders. The event aimed to deepen partnerships with various companies looking to recruit and invest in diverse, skilled professionals prepared for the demands of the job market.

Attendees engaged in a series of workshops, panel discussions, and networking sessions designed to enhance career development, leadership skills, and professional readiness. The summit also offered an opportunity for participants to gain valuable insights into workforce trends and the evolving landscape of industries ranging from healthcare to technology.

"I learned so much. There was such a strong sense of community, and I truly felt welcome. The summit was far beyond my expectations," Estrella said of her experience.

One of the summit's highlights was the presentation of need-based scholarships. Twelve attendees, including Montana Pozos, were awarded a \$15,000 scholarship to support their academic pursuits and career goals.

"I haven't even used the money; it has already relieved stress

and provided mental relief," said Montana. "It is solidifying my goals to become a dental hygienist and one day a dentist."

For St. Philip's College, participation in the Workforce Development Summit aligns with its mission to provide students with opportunities for success that foster career readiness and community engagement.

SPC Hosts Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony for the Georgene Irene Bias Book Collection





St. Philip's College (SPC) celebrated Black History Month on Feb. 26, 2025, with a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Georgene Irene Bias Collection at the college's library. The event honored the life of Dr. Bias, a librarian, educator, and advocate for academic excellence.

Dr. Bias began her career at SPC in 1959, rising to become a professor and head librarian. In recognition of her years of service, she was granted the title of professor emeritus.

Dr. Bias graduated from Phyllis Wheatley High School in 1943 before earning a bachelor's degree from Prairie View A&M University in 1947. She later obtained a Master's in Education in 1953, a Master's in Library Science in 1973 from Our Lady of the Lake University, and a Doctorate in Education from Nova University in 1982.

Her newly dedicated book collection serves as a resource for students, faculty, and researchers, providing insight into Black studies and the Black diaspora.

Following the ribbon-cutting ceremony, attendees were invited to explore the collection and enjoy refreshments.
