## Dr. Ricardo Romo

Ricardo Romo grew up in San Antonio's Guadalupe community and Prospect Hill. A graduate of Fox Tech High School, he attended the University of Texas at Austin on a track scholarship. He earned All-American honors in track, and was the first Texan to run the mile in less than four minutes.


Romo earned his bachelor of science degree at the University of Texas at Austin; and a master's degree in history from Loyola Marymount University (1970). He earned a Ph.D. in history from University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) in 1975. A nationally-respected urban historian, Romo has taught and published in the field of civil rights, Mexican American history, and urban history. He is the author of "East Los Angeles: History of a Barrio," now in its ninth printing, which has been published in English and Spanish.

Romo served as the fifth president of the University of Texas at San Antonio from 1999 to 2017. Today, Romo serves the community on numerous boards, including: Southwest Research Institute, Brackenridge Park Conservancy, Humanities Texas, and World Affairs Council. He is also active as a cultural and political writer and editorial board member for La Prensa Texas, a bilingual newspaper in San Antonio.

A talented photographer, Romo's photos have been included in numerous regional exhibits including "Havana" and "Small Town Texas," from which photos were selected for an exhibit in China, "Infinite Horizons: Visions of Texas." He and his wife Harriett are avid collectors of Latino art and active in several Texas museums.

Ricardo and his wife, Harriett, have been recognized for their philanthropy in the arts. Over the past 20 years, they have donated nearly 2,000 Latino art prints and paintings to a dozen museums, including:
